

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Many exciting initiatives are underway in Mount Vernon! The Highway 30 bypass is presently under construction; two hundred new homes are slated to be built adjacent to Stonebrook and near the Elliott Athletic Complex in the next 10 years; the Community Wellness Center recently surpassed the \$1.9 million mark in funds raised and will break ground this fall to begin construction on this exciting new community resource; and last but certainly not least, Mount Vernon voters overwhelmingly approved a \$12.8 million bond referendum on April 3rd of this year. Included within the facility upgrades is the construction of a new performing arts center at Mount Vernon High School. Seating for 768 was planned, however given the growth that is anticipated in our community, the fine arts community has identified the need for an additional 80 seats and other amenities that were not able to be included in the bond. As a result, the district is looking to raise an additional \$250,000 from donors and friends, including Mount Vernon alumni.

The Mount Vernon Alumni Association is extremely excited and supportive of this fundraising initiative as we believe not only students, but the entire community, will benefit from the value of this state-of-theart fine arts center. Page 26 of this newsletter highlights additional information about the project and how you can help in the completion of this special community project.

A Smithsonian exhibit "Hometown Teams: How Sports Shape America" was on display in the gym of the First Street Community Center in Mount Vernon from March 16 to April 29, 2018. In addition to a static presentation from the Smithsonian, college and high school teams and sports-related activities from Linn and the seven surrounding counties were also included. Mount Vernon's wrestling, volleyball, football, and the 1967-93 marching bands were represented in the local part of the display.

After leaving Mount Vernon the exhibit traveled to Ottumwa, Iowa, followed by Guthrie Center, Jefferson, Ames and Conrad. Each stay will last approximately two months. The exhibit provided by the Smithsonian will be the same in each venue, but the local sports exhibits will be unique to each of the hosting communities. THE PASSING OF A GREAT TEACHER...

RICHARD PETERS

Dick Peters passed away on February 7, 2018. A local citizen for over 50 years, his professional career spanned the better part of 40 years in Mount Vernon, mainly at Mount Vernon High School (1967-1988) and Cornell College (1988-2004). A respected teacher, scholar, and historian, Peters was a servant leader to all that made his acquaintance and was a giver of the highest order.

Those lucky enough to have been taught or coached by Peters at MVHS may recall that sitting in his classroom was no ordinary experience. The educational environment Peters provided to the MVHS student body was an art form: part learning, part entertainment, and part enthusiasm. Always prepared and extremely well read, Peters would draw us in with words, gestures, and mental imagery on important historical subject matter. During the lecture and without fail, he could sense when the class needed a short mental break the would fill the void with humor and wit relating the historical topic to our modern day life only to bring us back moments later to the original lesson plan.

Peters was proud of his students and I am aware that Peters took great joy when students thoughtfully considered his subject matter or put in the time and work to master it. He allowed us to consider subjects like American history. criminal justice, and racism on our own terms...all of which helped countless Mount Vernon students take ownership of their education and gain an appreciation for our sense of community and our relationship with each other.

Throughout his professional teaching career in Mount Vernon, Peters also seemed to be called to serve us all. His unwavering interest in helping his fellow man parlayed into a list of volunteer activities of which he received little to no personal economic benefit. Here are a few: served his country in the US Army, personal/private advising & mentoring, coaching, Sunday school teaching, Iowa State Penitentiary GED teaching, city government (our former mayor), 30 years of semi-annual Mount

Vernon Bank lectures, Lions Club, Kids In Need, Mount Vernon United Methodist Church parishioner/leader/volunteer, and longtime Mount Vernon Preschool president.

Although quiet about his personal life, Peters was proud of his family who provided him a lifetime of wonderful, loving, and loyal support. His wife Linda continues to live in Mount Vernon while daughter Marcia (MVHS 1985) lives in Minneapolis, MN and daughter Laura (MVHS 1987) resides in Ames, IA.

Peters once told me that to be of genuine service to others was his greatest achievement. We should all be this good.
















Mustangs...what are they doing now?

The Pierce family (parents, myself, Cyndy, Valerie, and Doug) moved to Mount Vernon when my father took a teaching job at Cornell. This was 1967, the year Dutch Elm disease hit Mount Vernon and dozens of grand old elm trees were cut down, including one that shaded our front yard on 2nd St NW.

I attended eighth grade in the old junior high school on 3rd St, one of the last years it was open. Ninth grade was at the old high school, at the crest of the hill on Main Street before it swoops down and past the cemetery to Lisbon. I remember Mr. Landis laying down some rules about class behavior, saying he had a pointer stick that could reach people in the front rows and as for those in back, well, he could spit forty feet. Then there was Mrs Rife, who demanded and got the best from her students. We had to memorize and then deliver to the class a ten minute long speech or book selection. This seemed impossible but we did it, and fifty years later I can still rattle off "John Claverhouse was a moon-faced man. You know the kind.....". My senior class was the first to attend the new high school out on Palisades Road.

I had several jobs as a teenager.
Delivered the Cedar Rapids Gazette for a year. Cleaned at Stoltz Laundromat on Main Street and later Hartung Butcher on the south side of the Hwy 1 and Main Street intersection. Did a couple of summers on the Cornell grounds and paint crews.

After high school I went to Cornell for a year but took the next two years off. I moved to South Dakota and mined gold for a few months, then moved back to Mount Vernon and worked at Cherry Burrell in Cedar Rapids for a year, and finally returned to Cornell.

After Cornell I found a temporary summer job at ACT in Iowa City. Around that time



I was offered a permanent job selling insurance but I didn't like the sound of that, and meanwhile the restroom graffiti at ACT was the best I had ever seen so I took my chances with ACT. Luckily, that summer job turned permanent and lasted several years until the contract was won by a company in California, and in January of 1981 I moved there with my girlfriend, who had been my supervisor at ACT. Three years later the girlfriend was gone and the contract had returned to lowa but I stayed in California. I worked a variety of jobs and along the way learned a bit about computers, which led to a programmer/ analyst job at UCLA. I retired about two years ago, still do some consulting, live a mile from the beach, and I guess I owe it all to great restroom graffiti.

Highlights? I don't know.... Well, I helped a girl I knew from Mongolia get tickets to a sumo wrestling match in Las Vegas - how random a conversation is that? Shook Ringo's hand. Lost everything I owned in a fire on the last day Bush was in office (coincidence?). Bought a bell in Mandalay, Myanmar. Got a hard stare from OJ. Walked across Abbey Road ("One sweet dream came true, today...").

It's been a while since I lived in Mount Vernon but it doesn't seem like much time at all. In my mind, my Mount Vernon years are equal to everything since. They're a part of me, at the core of who I am, and to this day, when asked where I'm from, my answer is always, proudly, Mount Vernon, Iowa.

And then I usually have to explain it's not where potatoes come from....

During this time I was able to go to several national conventions to further my nursing knowledge and network with future nurses from around the country. After graduating from nursing school in 2015, I started working at the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics on an inpatient pediatric unit. In 2017, we made the move to the new University of Iowa Stead Family Children's Hospital, where I became more specialized and now work on the 11th floor, Pediatric Hematology-Oncology and Bone Marrow Transplant.

I am currently still a staff nurse on level 11 of the University of Iowa Stead Family Children's Hospital. I am a member of several committees, both unit based and hospital-wide. First Year Favorite Memo-

ry: I was teaching first grade in McAllen, Texas, which is about as far south in Texas as you can get. I read a story during the winter that talked about children playing in snow. Looking around, I saw 18 blank faces. When I questioned how many kids had ever seen snow, not one student raised their hand. Trying to explain snow to first graders proved to be quite difficult. That night, I called my parents, who lived in Mount Vernon, and asked them to video tape the snow that had fallen (remember it was 1985, so video tapes were high-tech)! As luck would have it, the next day there was a big snowstorm. A few day's later my first graders got to experience a snowstorm Texas style," which means I turned the air-conditioning down. They asked to watch that video at least 20 times over the winter months.

Mentor: Too many to count! I have taught second, third, and kindergarten in MV and all the teachers in those grade levels were helpful and supportive beyond belief!

Memory: I'm sure this has happened to many teachers during their career, but it is the one of the things that "keep us coming back". I had a third grader who struggled with behavior and academics. He thought he couldn't do anything, but of course, I kept telling him that he had the skills to have the future he wanted, but he had to do the work. He ended up leaving Mount Vern on not long after he was in third grade so I lost track of him. About 12 years later, I was called to the office during lunch because I had a visitor. It was this former student, who wanted to stop in and see me. He just wanted me to know that he had graduated from high school, was supporting himself in a job that he loved, and was soon to be married. He also wanted to apologize to me for his behavior and how difficult he was at times. He told me that he always remembered what I said about working for the future he wanted and that is what got him through some difficult times. Not many elementary teachers get remembered in that way, so that is a success story I will always cherish.

An opportunity to help add auditorium seating in our NEW

On April 3, 2018 voters in Mount Vernon overwhelmingly approved a \$12.8 million bond referendum for facility upgrades, including the construction of a NEW PERFORMING ARTS CENTER at Mount Vernon High School. This has long been a desire of the community and will support the district's high-quality fine arts programs that are expanding in participation each year. As part of the current plan, the performing arts center will include a 768-seat auditorium, orchestra pit, lobby, dressing rooms, set shop and outdoor plaza area.

Students are tracking themes throughout these books and discussing in small groups how characters are overcoming the obstacles they faced throughout these stories. In the next few weeks, students will extend these studies into math, science, and social studies. In math class, students will be learning how to use a slide rule. The objectives are for the students to learn some history of the math tools that were used during this time and to increase their mental math skills. In science class, eighth graders will design and conduct their own straw rocket experiments as well as learn about the history of the Apollo space program. In social studies, students will learn about the causes for the Space Race, including the beginning of the Cold War between the U.S. and Soviet Union after World War II."
